About the Sioux Falls School District...

Sioux Falls is the largest city in South Dakota with a population of 178,000 people. Dr. Brian Maher, Superintendent of Schools, heads the Sioux Falls School District.

There are three public high schools in Sioux Falls: Lincoln, Roosevelt, and Washington, each having the population of approximately 2,000 students. There are five middle schools and 24 elementary schools.

About Sioux Falls Lincoln High School....

Lincoln High School is located in the southeast part of Sioux Falls, just off Interstate 229. The building opened in 1965. The school is administered by Mr. Robert Grimm —Principal, Mr. Lance Luitjens—Assistant Principal, Mr. Don Ryswyk—Assistant Principal, and Mr. Joseph Struwe—Activities Principal.

About the Music Department at Sioux Falls Lincoln...

There are three large choirs and six auditioned small ensembles under the direction of Mrs. Linda Conrad and Mrs. Kathy Ferguson. Over 200 students are involved in vocal music at Lincoln High School. There are two large orchestras and two chamber ensembles under the direction of Dr. Mario Chiarello. Moreover, there are approximately 100 orchestral musicians in the Lincoln High School Orchestra program. Nearly one-third of the total student body is involved in music at Sioux Falls Lincoln High School.

About Sioux Falls Lincoln High School Bands...

The band program consists of four concert bands and three jazz bands, totaling nearly 250 students. The bands are the Symphonic Band, Concert Band, Varsity Band, the Freshman (ninth grade) Band, and Jazz I, Jazz II, and Jazz III. Each concert band meets daily for 50 minutes, and each jazz band meets daily for 25 minutes. The bands combine for marching band, which this year numbered 240 members (not all members elect to be in marching band). There are two full-time directors, Dan Carlson and Sam Anderson. The Lincoln High School Marching Band has performed four times at the Pasadena Tournament of Roses Parade and 3 times in the Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade. The band program is supported by a very active booster organization. In 2010, the Lincoln High School Band program set a new state record for the number of students from one high school in South Dakota All-State Band with a total of 37 students. This is the seventh appearance of the Lincoln High School Band at the South Dakota Bandmasters Association Clinic.

Daniel Carlson

Mr. Dan Carlson graduated in 1994 from Pipestone High School (MN). While in middle and high school, he marched in both the Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade (1988), as well as the Pasadena Tournament of Roses Parade (1994). In 1999, he received his Bachelor of Music Education degree from South Dakota State University in Brookings, South Dakota. He

also completed his Masters of Music Education Degree from the American Band College of Southern Oregon University during the summer of 2004.

Mr. Carlson was a Drum Major for the Pride of the Dakotas marching band at SDSU from 1995 through 1998. During his time at SDSU, he marched in the 1996 Inaugural Parade in Washington D.C. In 1992 and 1997 he was a member of Phantom Regiment Drum and Bugle Corps. He has been writing drills for high school and college marching bands around the country since 1996, and has also been an active clinician for drum majors around the region. Mr. Carlson is in his nineteenth year of teaching band at Lincoln High School in Sioux Falls, South Dakota. Mr. Carlson performed in 2004 at the South Dakota Bandmaster's Convention with his concert band, and assisted with the symphonic band in their appearances at the Bandmaster's Convention in 2001, 2006, 2010, and 2013. During his time at Lincoln, the LHS Patriot Marching Band has performed in the Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade in New York City in 2000 and 2008, and in the Pasadena Tournament of Roses Parade in Pasadena, California in 2005 and 2013. In 2015, the Lincoln Band was a finalist at the Bands of America St. Louis Super Regional, placing 13th overall in finals competition. The band also marched in the Hollywood Christmas Parade in 2016. The band continues to be recognized as one of the top programs in the upper Midwest in all facets. Mr. Carlson is a member of Phi Beta Mu and the South Dakota Bandmaster's Association, and was recently featured in School Band and Orchestra Magazine in the article "50 Directors Who Make a Difference". He was also received the Phi Beta Mu Outstanding Bandmaster Award for the state of South Dakota in 2016.

Mr. Carlson has been a director at Lincoln for the past 19 years, and has been the head director at Lincoln High School for the past five years - a position previously held by his father for 14 years (during which time they taught together as a father-son team). Dan now directs the Symphonic and Varsity Bands, as well as the marching band, and Jazz Band I and 3. Mr. Carlson has two daughters, Isabel and Adrienne.



Sam Anderson

In Sam Anderson has been teaching at Lincoln since 2013.

He graduated from LHS in 2002 and was very involved in the comprehensive band program. As a performer, he was also a member of the Madison Scouts Drum & Bugle Corps in 2001 and again in 2003 when he was a soloist in the field show and was Mellophone Champion at the DCI Individual & Ensemble Contest.

In 2006, Mr. Anderson received his Bachelor of Music Education degree from the University of Northwestern (St. Paul, MN). As an undergraduate student, he performed featured trumpet solos with the Symphonic Band, Jazz Band, and Orchestra while under the tutelage of Dr. Phil Norris. From 2007-2013 Mr. Anderson taught 5-12 Band at Heritage Christian Academy in Maple Grove, MN. From 2009-2013 he was the Assistant Marching Band Director at Park Center Senior High School in Brooklyn Park, MN. In 2011 and 2012, the band was crowned State Champion at the Vikingland Band Festival in Alexandria, MN. In 2015, Mr. Anderson received the "Dennis Hegg Outstanding Young Director" Award from the South Dakota Bandmasters Association. In 2016 he earned a Master of Music Education Degree from Northern State University in Aberdeen, SD. In 2017 he was the guest conductor for the CMBDA (Central Minnesota Band Director's Association) First-Year Honor Band in Zimmerman, MN.

Mr. Anderson is a member of the South Dakota Bandmaster's Association and the National Association for Music Education. He enjoys playing trumpet at church and occasionally with the South Dakota Symphony Orchestra. At LHS, he currently directs the Concert Band, Freshman Band, Jazz 2, and assists with the Pep Band and Marching Band.

He and his wife Marlea have four children: Owen, April, Ivan, and Azalea.
